We started the year off with a fantastic outdoor evening screening of *The Reunited States* for Constitution Day. The cinema sized screen brought the film and the Q and A with two of the film stars afterwards to life! Our experienced democracy fellow, Sky McCloskey, led the Q and A. Beyond Constitution Day, Sky worked weekly throughout the fall to help students across campus to register and to request absentee ballots. Sky and I both worked the polls on election day, giving us an upclose view of election details.

In October, local candidates for a wide range of races came together in HPCC for Meet the Candidates Night. Community members and students were able to ask questions, get to know the candidates, and mingle with each other and some of our alumni running for office.

Director Abby Schroeder and I attended the OAC All-In Challenge awards in early November, and we were pleased to earn a Silver Seal for Mount Union's high rate of voter participation. Additionally, we were awarded Best Action Plan for our written action plan to increase student voting engagement.

Although November is behind us, the primaries are around the corner! Democracy Fellows Sky McCloskey and new fellow Mohannahas Fitch-Pennybaker are continuing to reach out to students this semester to get help them to understand the importance of spring elections in addition to November.

We also began the semester with two student-focused events. In late January we held an internship panel featuring students who have completed internships



to help other students to think about and plan their own internships. Zach Berdyz '22, an NSFIA major, spoke about his internship with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms; Tanner Dixon '23, an NSFIA and international affairs and diplomacy double major; and Sky McCloskey '23, political science, spoke about their internships with Senator Rob Portman, and Xae Cloud '22 spoke about his internship with the State Public Defender's office in Allen County, Ohio.

In February, Brothers Building Bonds hosted our first Civic Coffee and Donuts discussion, a guided discussion open to all students. The Freedom Society hosted our March discussion, while April and May will include Sister Circle, Gender Equity Matters, the Green Raiders, and Regula Fellows.

It's been a busy year so far, and we are so fortunate to have fantastic students and faculty who are excited about the Regula Center's mission. Together we are paving the way for students to realize "fulfilling lives, meaningful work, and responsible citizenship."

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

The Center facilitated campus-wide participation in the **ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge** and assisted with conference-wide outreach through OAC Votes.

NASPA and the Campus Vote Project awarded Mount Union the designation of **Voter Friendly Campus** based on the Regula Center's Civic Engagement Action Plan.







Meet the Candidates Night was a meet and greet event in which candidates from the Stark County ballot came to engage with members of the campus community.

Conversations were hosted by student organizations included Brothers Building Bonds, Freedom Society, Sister Circle, Gender Equity Matters, Regula Scholars, and the Green Raiders.

Constitution Day was celebrated with a screening of *The Reunited States* on an outdoor screen in the quad. Afterwards, the film producer and actors virtually answered student questions.



SERVICE PROJECTS

Service Highlights:

Literacy Kits: An effort for adult education and family literacy week involved students and employees at the University, United Way, the Kiwanis Club of Alliance, Friends of Rodman Public Library, and Alliance Area Chamber of Commerce businesses. The efforts resulted in 900 literacy kits were designed to encourage familial connections through reading and emphasize the importance of literacy.

Monthly Projects: Each month the Center offered a take and make project and two in-person service opportunities. More than 200 students participated in fall take and make projects. In-person projects mobilized more than 400 participants and included collecting more than 6,280 pounds of food, parks clean-ups, upcycling with the Green Raiders, and more.

Expanded Holiday Outreach: The Regula Center increased the number of children sponsored through university efforts, and more than 100 children received gifts from members of the Mount Union community. Children were participants in outreach coodinated by the YWCA and the Salvation of Army of Alliance.

MLK Day of Service: More than 300 volunteers took place in MLK Day 2022 working with 16 community partners.







RAIDERS COVE

Raiders Cove, a resource center focused on assisting students with food, hygiene items, and clothing needs opened in 2020 with support from AmeriCorps members through Serve Ohio and Ohio Campus Compact.

The Regula Center works closely with the Center for Student Success and the Office of the Chaplain to oversee Raiders Cove. Current AmeriCorps members include Mount Union students Justin Sturgill, Hayley Maher, Jon Starek, and Julia Polyak.

The Regula Center also facilitated monthly cooking classes for students through Raiders Cove.

Pay it Forward


David '63 and Elaine (Venen '63) Dabelko have been dedicated to Mount Union and the work of the Regula Center.

In 2020, they created an additional endowment to support the Pay it Forward Program. The program is based on a model used by Ohio Campus Compact in which students participate in Service-Learning and ultimately award grants to area agencies.

Spring 2022 Courses using Pay it Forward funding include Kelsey Scanlon's exercise science course, Worksite Wellness, and Beth Canfield-Simbro's sociology course, Many Faces of Poverty.

Faculty Support

The Center supported several faculty incorporating service in their courses. Support included visiting classes, overseeing project implementation, securing guest speakers, and coordinating projects with partners. Courses offering service components represented various departments and levels of engagement.

This year Abby Schroeder, director of the Regula Center, began serving on the Ohio Campus Compact Advisory Board and the Talent Subcommittee of Strengthening Stark.

Protecting Stark's Future


Abby Schroeder, director of the Regula Center, and Kristine Still, founding dean of the College of Applied and Social Sciences, secured a yearlong planning grant through the Stark Community Foundation's Protecting Starks Future Initiative. The grant funded training, needs assessments, and collaboration throughout the community to work towards ending childhood poverty. Formal findings and next steps will be published in the summer of 2022.

Lunch with a Purpose

The Regula Center hosted monthly lunch gatherings featuring agencies serving the Alliance area. Guest speakers included Eric Taggart, Rodman Public Library; Kim Stanley, Alliance Area Domestic Violence Shelter; Stacie Weimer, YWCA; Niki McIlvain, Alliance Area Habitat for Humanity; Gina Bowers, Alliance Rape Crisis Center.

Community Meals

The Regula Center started assisting with the Tuesday evening community dinners hosted at Christ United Methodist Church. During the months of December, January, February, April, and May volunteers from Mount Union will serve the meal. The YWCA of Alliance is sponsoring the cost of food served.



Awards

The Center launched two new awards to recognize leaders in Stark County. The Ralph Regula Award for Public Service and the Mary Regula Award for Community Service will be awarded annually.

The Center cast a wide net for soliciting nominations from community members across Stark County. The Ralph Regula Award for Public Service recognized Judge Edward J. Elum and the Mary Regula Award for Volunteerism recognized Leigh Mainwaring.
