MONTHLY SERVICE PROJECTS

September - Super Service Saturday

More than 100 students and community members came together for a Roadway Cleanup on September 16. Mount Union served as the meeting point for volunteers. The Center coordinated logistics, recruitment, and volunteer support.

October - Raider Aid

A group of Mount Union students worked tirelessly on October 5 to raise more than \$1,700 for victims of Hurricane Florence. The Regula Center donated raffle baskets and helped organize over 100 students to collect donations across the community.

October - Trick-or-Treat for Canned Goods

A dedicated group of students woke up early on a rainy Saturday morning to make their community more pleasant for those who live there. Working together with Keep Alliance Beautiful, the students planted trees, bushes, and flowers in a large, previously empty, lot on a main Alliance roadside.

December - Adopt-a-Family

Each year, the Regula Center sponsors local families in need and makes their holidays a little brighter. A large gift tree was placed on a common area in campus with tags of needed items that students and faculty could pick up with their holiday shopping. The large kits were personally tailored to the needs of each family and delivered to them over the holidays.

January - MLK Day of Service

The annual MLK Day of service is a signature event of the Regula Center, and it mobilzes more volunteers than any other event in the Alliance area. On January 21, 525 volunteers met at Mount Union to spend a day serving the local community.

February - Fidget Boards

A group of 20 students gathered together to make 100 fidget boards in less than two hours. Fidget boards are used to help seniors with Alzheimer's to improve their hand movements and to keep their minds active. The boards were donated to seven different nursing homes and assisted livings to maximize their impact.

March - Hygiene Kits

On March 27, 50 students gathered to put together 400 hygiene kits donated to multiple locations across the Alliance community. These kits included the daily essentials for women and babies that may have otherwise gone without.

April - Kiwanis One Day/Global Youth Service Day

As it does each spring, the Center partnered with Kiwanis, Alpha Phi Omega, and Greek Life at Mount Union for a parks cleanup.

May - Trash to Treasure Sale

The Center hosted the annual Trash to Treasure sale as a way to eliminate waste as students leave for the summer and fund the Pay it Forward Program.

FEATURED EVENTS SUPER SERVICE SATURDAY

On a beautiful Saturday in September, more than 100 students and community members came together to transform the local Butler Rodman Park. In partnership with Lowe's, the group completed various projects to increase the accessibility and usefulness of the park for families and community members of all ages.

A few of the tasks completed include adding cornhole boards, painting the shelters, cleaning up trail entrances, adding a miniature golf course, and more. The project will be completed in the spring.

CIVIC CORNERS



In addition to local outreach using the Civic Corners, Dr. Lori Kumler and Gina Maida have presented the concept and outcomes in various methods including the Ohio Private Academic Libraries (OPAL) conference, Ohio Library Conference (OLC) conference and Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) annual meeting. In 2018, the Regula Center worked with the Department of Political Science and International Studies, as well as the Mount Union Library, to become the first University to install special kiosks to help students fulfill their civic duties. Located in the Kolenbrander-Harter Information Center (KHIC) and Hoover-Price Campus Center (HPCC), these kiosks serve as resources that allow students to request an absentee ballot, complete voter registration, and locate and send messages to their elected officials. Since the development of the corners, the Center has provided the funding and oversight to sell personalized kiosks to other libraries and institutions. To date. a Civic Corner was donated to Alliance High School and orders have been fulfilled for kiosks throughout Ohio and as far away as Washington.
