Particularly in times when facilities are not being utilized, such as in the summer months, the University will host camps for youth athletics or other events programmed by the Department of Athletics, as well as Academic Departments and other organizations to encourage activity on the campus for continuing education.

Definitions

Term	Definition		
Institution Sponsored Camp	include athletic or academic camps, clinics, tournaments or other events held at University facilities during the academic year or during the summer months that are used as fundraisers to offset University business-related expenses, such as uniforms, travel, etc. In this case, the primary motivation for the event is so that the team or department can raise money through volunteering to serve its participants.		
Academic Camp	are held at University facilities during summer months and are conducted by a University Academic Department. The primary motivation for the event is to raise awareness about a University of Mount Union academic area and/or programs.		
Coach/Professor as operator camp	are typically instructional in nature with University coaches or professors providing instruction to minor participants and are held <u>only</u> in the summer when fall and spring classes are not in session. Mount Union classifies these events as independent camps or clinics with the coach/professor acting as an independent operator. Examples of such events in past practice include football (individual and team camps), men's and women's basketball camps, science camp, soccer camp, running camp and volleyball camp.		
Third Party Camps	are typically instructional in nature, with outside, independent organizations renting the use of University facilities to conduct seminars or clinics that are held <u>only</u> in the summer when fall and spring classes are not in session. These camps may be overnight camps and use University sleeping facilities or to be day camps in nature. Examples of such events in past practice include Buckeye Girls State, YM Leaders Camp, Methodist Women, and high school band camps.
